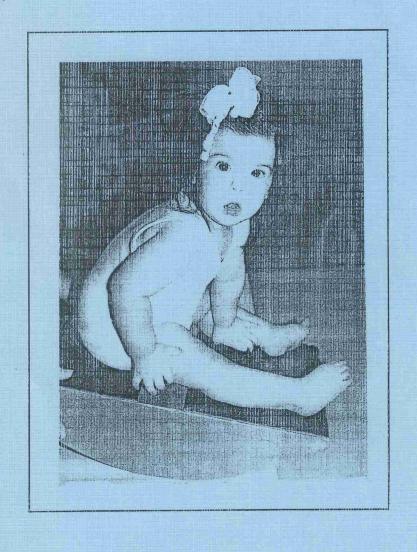

President's Report

This past year has seen the active implementation of the Association's Strategic Plan which identified new directions for service delivery and recognized the increasing need for fundraising to meet the ongoing requirements and challenges facing the Association. In particular, we have seen the development of the "Family Centered Planning" approach to the delivery of services. The response from families to Family Centered Planning has been very positive. The Association is proving to be a leader in this area.

This year has also seen the formation of a Foundation made up of members of the Association. We are looking towards our future funding requirements. The Foundation includes an endowment fund, the interest from which goes to support the Association's programs.

Special thanks to the Auxiliary who continue to provide tremendous support to the Association. The Whalley property which formerly housed one of the Auxiliary thrift stores sold this past year with the Auxiliary making an unprecedented donation of \$231,000 to the Foundation.

Proposed changes to gaming regulations threaten a major source of our private fundraising, being the Bingo operations. It is hoped this area of fundraising will remain with the non-profit societies. The continued support of government, the United Way and a variety of service clubs is very much appreciated and is essential to the continued operation of our programs.

April of this year saw the unveiling of our Donors Wall, "Friends of the Lower Fraser Valley Cerebral Palsy Association".

Again, our thanks to all our friends who have generously contributed in supporting our services. Your support makes a real difference to our ability to provide needed services to children and their families.

I continue to appreciate the dedication and professionalism of the staff, including the Management Team, who have brought about major changes to our delivery of services. I am confident that the organization will continue to develop and meet the challenges ahead.

Finally, I wish to express my appreciation to both past and present members of the Board of Directors. To those who are not now with us, your energy and involvement was important and made a difference. Our immediate Past President, Peter Winford, I especially wish to thank for the leadership he has given the Board. On behalf of the Board, I wish you every success with your new career in Kelowna.

As we head into the future, I am truly gratified to be working as part of a team aimed at the betterment of our organization.

Executive Director's Report

New ideas, new concepts, enriched services. There was much to cheer about at the Association this past year.

As mentioned in the President's and Medical Director's reports, much energy was spent in the creation, development, training for and implementation of a Family Centered Care approach. Over the past two years we have sought out different methodologies, listened to what other people have been attempting in North America and have taken what we perceived to be the best of all options and developed our own system for Family Centered Care. Many, many hours of preparation have gone into the change and special thanks go out to the Steering Group for developing and implementing the plan -- Janette Thomas, parent and Board member; Judit Spence, Director of Physiotherapy; Sharon McInnes, Director of Family Services; and John Maddalozzo, Centre Coordinator.

The staff all enthusiastically accepted the challenge of this change. Thanks to the excellent orientation of all staff by the Steering Committee assisted by Dr. Glen Davies and Ron Schmidt, the monumental task of rethinking how we provide services was accomplished as planned. Unfortunately this meant some service availability had to be diminished during the period November to January in order to provide all families with the opportunity to have a Family Service Plan developed. To those whose therapy was disrupted during this time we offer our apologies. We are already beginning to see the long-term benefits of our move to the Family Centered Care approach. We will continue to evaluate and fine-tune different aspects of this more holistic approach as new situations develop.

As a result of the significant work done by our Centre in developing this care plan approach, staff have been requested to speak at workshops. We hope in the current year to be able to plan a provincial workshop specifically for those interested from other Child Development Centres.

This past year the Centre also sponsored 2 one-week courses on Assessment for therapists from all over the province. The course was given by Vickie Meade from St. Paul, Minnesota and was organized most effectively by Mary-Ann Snell, from our Occupational Therapy Department. It was a great success — so much so that we will be running another series of courses again this fall.

During the year we were fortunate to obtain a Canadian Job Strategies Grant to provide training opportunities for four people in Preschool, Administration, Fundraising and Therapy support. We hope to continue to provide opportunities for training which are of mutual advantage to the individuals and the Centre. Thanks to Cheryl, Anita, Alana and Brian for your dedication and enthusiasm.

During the year we made some changes to the Centre. We improved the parking layout and improved access to computers for the therapists with the purchase of three computers.

With the increasing population in the area we serve, it has been difficult for each department to continue to provide quality care to our clients. The new initiatives in Family Centered Care impact on all departments. The greatest challenge has been for the Communication Therapy Department which is much smaller than the other two main therapy departments.

We hope in consultation with the Ministry of Health that this imbalance can be addressed in the near future.

Last summer we took the opportunity to complete the expansion to the Preschool which had to be deferred during the major expansion three years ago due to cost. The additional space has been well utilized by the staff and allows for much more openness of the total area and better accommodates program changes. It also gives the children more choices.

During the year the staff in the six residential facilities we operate sought and were granted certification with the B.C. Government Employees' Union. At the time of this writing, negotiations for a first Collective Agreement were in process.

In the fall of 1991, the decision was made to sell the Whalley property, previously occupied by the Auxiliary as a thrift store. We are most appreciative of the help, advice and contribution made by Colliers, Macaulay, Nicholls in the sale of this property. A significant gain on the original purchase price was realized as a result of the proximity to the new Skytrain station. We are deeply indebted to the Auxiliary for their most significant contribution and for their continuing support of the work done by the Association. Numerous hours are volunteered each year for fundraising efforts which benefit children attending the Centre.

To all Auxiliary members and to all our other donors and pledgers, large and small, we thank you all. Through your donations you have helped to sustain a level of services which otherwise could not be made available to the children.

A continuing area of concern has been the lack of recognition of the need for Physiotherapy and Occupational Therapy services to school-aged children. Much work was done by the Board of Directors and in particular Dianne Lewis in her capacity as President of the British Columbia Association of Child Development Centres in getting Ministry of Health recognition of this need. The results of this advocacy are now coming to fruition. We are most fortunate in having such a dedicated Board of Directors who give so willingly of their time to ensure the Association runs smoothly.

We are also most fortunate in having such a personally dedicated and committed staff who go out of their way to do what will best benefit the children and do it in such a caring and professional manner. To them all I would like to say, "Thank you for a job well done and in a way which says you care."

Medical Director's Report

The most noteworthy change in the past year has been the introduction of Family Centered Care. This pattern of care is supported by current paediatric literature and thus Variety Child Development Centre continues to offer excellent and up-to-date treatment.

As in the previous year I have seen almost all children referred to us rather than doing preliminary screening. With the help of Family Services and Psychology, suggestions for the management of children whose difficulties cannot be addressed by our current programs have been given to parents and the referring physicians. Of the 125 new children seen over the year, 72 were taken into the Centre's treatment programs.

Follow-up medical consultations are offered to some of the children at the request of parents or therapists or for children with complex and evolving needs. A medical review is also the initial step for children referred to the Feeding Team. Children whose swallowing difficulties require more investigation than we can offer here are referred to the Sunny Hill Feeding Assessment Unit and this collaboration is proceeding smoothly. Of course, ad hoc consultations with Variety Child Development Centre therapists are frequent.

Dr. Richard Beauchamp continues to hold his monthly orthopaedic clinics at the Centre offering valuable service to the children and their parents and therapists. His contribution to our program is much appreciated.

The commitment, energy, enthusiasm and excellence of Variety Child Development Centre staff are outstanding and I am always proud of my association with the Centre.

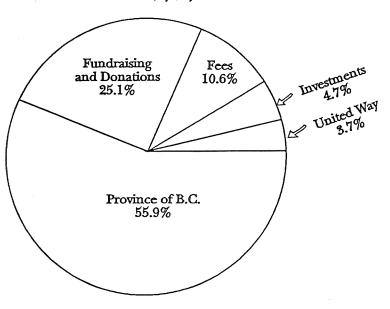

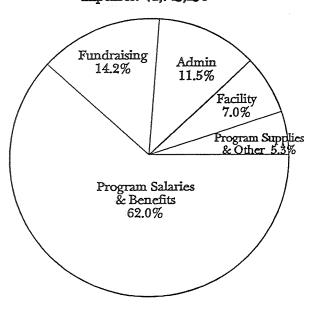

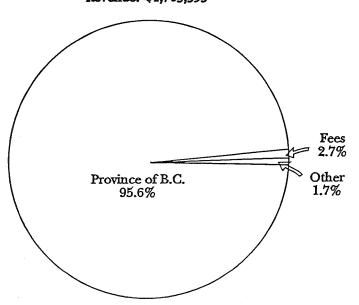
Variety Child Development Centre Operating Budget Sources Revenue: \$2,754,124



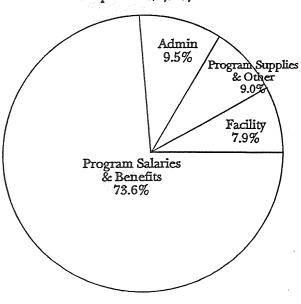
Variety Child Development Centre Operating Budget Sources Expenses: \$2,743,234

To the Members of LOWER FRASER VALLEY CEREBRAL PALSY ASSOCIATION

I have audited the balance sheet of Lower Fraser Valley Cerebral Palsy Association as at March 31, 1992 and the statements of capital surplus, revenue, expenses and operating surplus, changes in cash resources and schedules of operations for the year then ended. These financial statements are the responsibility of the Association's management. My responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on my audit.

Except as explained in the following paragraph I conducted my audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards. Those standards require that I plan and perform an audit to obtain reasonable assurance whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosure in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation.

In common with many charitable organizations, the Association derives revenue from donations and fund-raising, the completeness of which is not susceptible to satisfactory audit verification. Accordingly, my verification of these receipts was limited to the amounts recorded in the records of the Association and I was not able to determine whether any adjustments might be necessary to donation or fund-raising receipts, excess of revenue over expenses, assets and surplus.

In my opinion, except for the effect of adjustments, if any, which I might have determined to be necessary had I been able to satisfy myself concerning the completeness of the donations and fund-raising referred to in the preceding paragraph, these financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Association as at March 31, 1992, and the results of its operations and the changes in its cash resources for the year then ended in accordance with accounting principles as explained in Note 1 to the financial statements. As required by the Society Act of British Columbia, I report that, in my opinion, these principles have been applied, on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.

1. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

a) Depreciation of Buildings

The Variety Child Development Centre and Lookout Preschool buildings are depreciated using the declining balance method at an annual rate of 5% except that the donated portion of the Lookout Preschool is not depreciated. Adult Services and Children's Group Homes buildings are depreciated at an amount equal to the annual principal reduction in the related mortgages payable. Depreciation is charged to capital surplus in all divisions except Adult Services and Children's Group Homes. The policies for Adult Services and Children's Group Home buildings are required by Canada Mortgage and Housing Corporation and B.C. Housing Management Commission.

b) Depreciation of Furniture and Equipment

Furniture and equipment for all divisions are depreciated using the straight line method at an annual rate of 20%.

c) Deferred Capital Grants

Grants received in respect of additions to buildings, furniture and equipment are initially recorded in the balance sheet as deferred capital grants and are amortized in the same manner as the related assets.

d) Replacement Reserve

The replacement reserve account is funded by an annual charge against earnings as opposed to an appropriation of surplus.

7. VANCOUVER FOUNDATION

The Association is entitled to the income from a permanent endowment fund administered by the Vancouver Foundation. This fund totalled \$ 610,000 at March 31, 1992 and 1991. Interest on the fund is distributed quarterly to the Association.

8. CONTINGENT LIABILITIES

- a) A contingent liability exists for the amount of the retroactive wage increase under the April 1, 1991 wage reopener for the employees who are members of the Health Sciences Association of B.C. This amount cannot be accurately assessed at this time and no provision for any such retroactive wage increase as may eventually be awarded has been made in these financial statements.
- b) A contingent liability exists for the potential results of a retroactive wage reclassification arbitration which may be awarded to the employees of the Variety Child Development Centre preschool. This amount cannot be accurately assessed at this time and no provision for any such retroactive wage reclassification as may eventually be awarded has been made in these financial statements.
